

TOCATÌ FOR INTANGIBLE CULTURAL HERITAGE

Tocatì, International Festival of Games in the streets, is more than just an event. It is a permanent programme of activities and the expression of a community – the Ancient Games Association(AGA) from Verona, part of the network of the European Traditional Sports and Games Association (AEJeST), and of a global movement: the International Traditional Sport and Games Association (ITSGA).

Reaching its 15th Edition devoted to the European Regions, Tocatì proposes some meetings in the frame of its multinational nomination project for the safeguarding of Traditional Games and Sports as Intangible Cultural Heritage. In 2017 the two-day meeting will reinforce and broaden the dialogue started in 2016 with some local, regional, national and international institutions, the scientific community and NGOs that are part of the international network founded in 2010 in the framework of the Convention for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural Heritage (UNESCO 2003, the ICH NGOs Forum). It will take place over two days with three different sessions.

The first session is devoted to the presentation of the European Project TRADWOC (TRADitional Wrestling, Our Culture), under the AGA coordination: a concrete example of European partnership in an international approach to the safeguarding of Intangible Cultural Heritage (ICH).

The second session is devoted to a guided tour by AGA through the roads, squares and houses of Verona.

Finally, Sunday morning will be devoted to the presentation of the nomination process of Tocatì for the Register of Good Safeguarding Practices (UNESCO 2003 Convention): a synthesis of the different aspects and strategic points of the work through the voices of European and Italian partners.

The main aim of the two days is to build the European partnership for the nomination of Tocatì to the Register of Good Safeguarding Practices of the 2003 Convention, sharing the outcomes and consolidating the national and international partnership. This year the nomination project benefits from the official support of the Veneto Region, the European Association AEJeST and the Flanders (Belgium) through the participation of a Flemish delegation supporting the international cooperation process. The Tocatì Festival, for the second year, has the patronage of UNESCO with the official logo of the Convention for the Safeguarding of Intangible Cultural Heritage.

The key-words of the two days are: **Community/belonging/meeting**; **Intangible Cultural Heritage**; **Good safeguarding ICH practices**; **Traditional games and sports**; **Europe**.

3. European Round Table. A living network, more than a Festival!

Tocatì: a permanent programme of activities for the safeguarding of Traditional Games and Sports as ICH. Challenges and risks: a view on the process of safeguarding.

Round Table coordinated by Jorijn Neyrinck, Tapis Plein - Centre of Expertise on ICH and Participation - ICH NGO Forum, and Valentina Lapiccirella Zingari, Coordinator of the nomination process, Simbdea-AGA - ICH NGO Forum.

In the framework of the European Round Table, we invite participants from different contexts to share ideas on potential critical issues relating to safeguarding intangible heritage, defining a vision of the Tocatì experience as a community-based initiative engaged for the transmission of ludic cultures as ICH.

Tocatì is a living network, an urban regeneration tool, a local experience the opens the doors of Verona to a large community and audience, an international Festival. Tocatì aims at sustainably fostering the vivid practices of safeguarding traditional games and sports; at the same time it aims at avoiding the risks of cultural heritage de-contextualisation and spectacularisation. How to avoid such risks and support the Tocatì as a self-conscious tool for the AGA community, building a shared heritage for a broader national and international community?

Three mains questions/ perspectives are on the table:

- 1. Summarise the challenges
- 2. Rise ideas on boundary conditions for fostering a long term sustainable road forward for Tocatì
- 3. Discuss the needs/interests of the partners in the nomination process for the inscription to the Register of Good/Best Practices of UNESCO as tool for international cooperation, in the spirit of the Convention and taking into account the formulated challenges and boundary conditions
